SUB-FUND SUITABILITY

WHO IS THE SUB-FUND SUITABLE FOR?

The ILP Sub-Fund is only suitable for investors who seek capital appreciation over the medium term through investment in Brazilian Equities.

Therefore we suggest that you only invest money that can be committed for the medium to long term. You should also bear in mind that securities held within a Fund may not be denominated in the currency of that Fund, so unit prices may fall purely on account of exchange rate fluctuations.

Please note that Friends Provident International Limited ("FPIL") investment products are intended for medium to long term investment and are not therefore designed for early surrender. If you do surrender early, a product surrender charge may be applied. Please note that the earlier you terminate your plan, the more you may lose.

KEY FEATURES OF THE SUB-FUND

WHAT ARE YOU INVESTING IN?

You are investing in an ILP Sub-Fund that invests in the BNP Paribas Funds Brazil Equity Fund* ("the Fund" or "underlying fund"), apart from a proportionately small amount which may be held in cash to optimise dealing efficiencies in the underlying fund. We endeavour to maintain a cash balance limit of up to 0.75%.

-The underlying fund of the ILP Sub-Fund is an accumulation fund, which means the fund will automatically reinvest any dividends.

*The underlying fund is a Sub-Fund of BNP Paribas Funds. BNP Paribas Funds is an Open-Ended Investment Company incorporated in Luxembourg and its home regulator is the Commission de Surveillance du Secteur Financier (CSSF).

Market and Credit Risks

Foreign Exchange risk: The underlying assets of the Fund may be denominated in currencies other than the currency of the share class you have invested into. The value of your investment may rise or fall in line with movements in the relevant exchange rates.

Liquidity Risks

Liquidity risk: In general the Fund manages its investments, including cash, such that it can meet its liabilities for the redemption of any shares that investors wish to sell. Investments held may need to be sold if insufficient cash is available to finance such redemptions.

-If the size of the disposals is sufficiently large, or the market is illiquid, then there is a risk that either the investments might not be sold or the price at which they are sold may adversely affect the Net Asset Value of the Fund.

Product-Specific Risks

Country Concentration risk: The Fund's concentrated investment in a single or small number of countries may increase its Volatility due to the greater exposure to market, political, policy, foreign exchange, liquidity, tax, legal, regulatory, economic and social risks of those countries.

Equity risk: The value of stocks may fluctuate, sometimes dramatically, in response to the activities and results of individual companies or because of general market and economic conditions or other events, including changes in investment sentiment, political and issuer-specific factors.

Emerging Markets risk: Investments in emerging markets involve certain risks such as currency fluctuations and economic and political uncertainties. These markets are generally smaller in size and have less liquidity than developed markets.

Financial Derivative Instrument risk: The Fund may have exposure to derivatives for investment purposes or for Efficient Portfolio Management. Given the Leverage effect embedded in derivatives, such investments may result in higher volatility or a significant loss in the Fund's assets within a short period of time.

Charges are deducted by both FPIL and the underlying investment managers at each valuation point before calculating the unit price, as set out below.

FPIL charges (payable directly by you)

- You will need to pay an ILP Sub-Fund administration charge of 1.2%.
- There is currently no charge for switching Funds although switching to a Fund which differs from your plan currency may involve a cost associated with currency exchange. However, we reserve the right to charge for switches under certain conditions.
- Any sales and/or redemption charges will be determined by the terms of your Policy Conditions.

HOW CAN YOU EXIT FROM THIS INVESTMENT AND WHAT ARE THE RISKS AND COSTS IN DOING SO?

-There is a cooling off period of 30 days from when you receive your Policy Documents. If you decide to exit the policy during this time you should complete the Cancellation Form (enclosed with your Policy Documents) and send this back to the address provided, together with the original Policy Documents. We will refund any monies paid, less any shortfall (if any) as a result of the value of your investment falling by the time you tell us of your wish to cancel. If you elect to exit your policy after the cooling off period has expired, penalties may be applied.

-If you no longer wish to invest in the FPIL ILP Sub-Fund you have selected, you may switch all or part of your holdings into an alternative Fund(s) by sending us a completed Switch/Redirection Request form, signed. Switching from one Fund to another is done on a bid-to-bid basis, without charge (although we do reserve the right to charge). If you are switching between currencies, the relevant exchange rates will be applied, and shown on your switch confirmation.

-The sale proceeds that you receive will be the realisation price multiplied by the number of units sold, less any charges. An example (assuming a redemption charge of 4%) is as follows*:

APPENDIX : GLOSSARY OF TERMS
Debt Security

A debt investment, with which the investor loans money to an entity (company or government) that borrows the Funds for a defined period of time at a specified interest rate. The indebted entity issues investors a certificate, or bond, that states the interest rate (coupon rate) that will be paid and when the loaned Funds are to be returned (maturity date).

Efficient Portfolio Management (EPM)

EPM is a set of standards for prudent management of investment Funds. The standards call for economically appropriate transactions that reduce risk, reduce cost or generate additional capital or income. For example, a currency overlay strategy using derivative instruments could be used to reduce volatility in asset returns resulting from currency fluctuations or be used to take advantage of these fluctuations to gain extra return.

Equity

Ownership positions in companies that can be traded in public markets. Often produce current income which may be paid in the form of dividends. In the event of the company going bankrupt Equity holders' claims are subordinate to the claims of preferred stockholders and bondholders.

Expense Ratio

The Expense Ratio provides customers with an indication of the overall costs of investing in a particular Fund. The Expense Ratio as calculated in accordance with the Investment Management Association of Singapore's guidelines on the disclosure of Expense Ratios. Different methods of calculation of Expense Ratio can be used, including Total Expense Ratio (TER) and Ongoing Charges Figure (OCF) but these are broadly the same.

Financial Derivative Instruments (FDI)

Also known as Derivatives. Financial contracts whose value is tied to an underlying asset. Derivatives include futures and options.

Hedge / Hedging

Any transaction with the objective of limiting exposure to risk such as changes in exchange rates or prices.

Net Asset Value (NAV)

Net Asset Value is the value of the net assets of the Fund after deduction of all expenses.

Ongoing Charges Figure (OCF)

A type of Expense Ratio. The Ongoing Charges Figure is based on expenses for the previous year and is a ratio of the total ongoing charges to the Fund's average Net Asset Value over its last reporting period. This figure may vary from year to year. The charges you pay are used to pay the costs of the underlying fund, including the costs of marketing and distributing it. These charges reduce the potential growth of your investment.

Open-Ended Investment Company

An Open-Ended Collective Investment vehicle, structured as an investment company, where new shares are created or redeemed, depending on demand from investors.

Specified Investment Product (SIP)

SIP is a class of investment products defined by the Monetary Authority of Singapore (MAS). Generally, (although not in all instances), financial advisers have to carry out more due diligence, including customer knowledge assessment, when advising about a SIP.

UCITS

The Undertakings for Collective Investment in Transferable Securities (UCITS) Directive 2009/65/EC. This a regulatory framework of the European Commissions that creates harmonisation throughout Europe with respect to the management and sale of mutual funds

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
